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■ Following the Black Lives Matter protests in the United States, large, peaceful protests have taken place in European capital cities including Amsterdam, Berlin, Brussels, London, Paris and Vienna to denounce racism and police violence. Discrimination and institutional racism are still rife in our Council of Europe member States. Upholding equality and human rights are at the core of the work and activities of the Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE). We have a duty and moral obligation to uphold such rights and condemn systemic discrimination and institutional racism.

■ The COVID-19 crisis has exacerbated the impact of structural discrimination and made it more visible. People of African and Asian descent have been disproportionately affected by the disease, for reasons that deserve further investigation but appear to originate from differences in social and economic status, access to healthcare services, as well as cultural perceptions.

■ By addressing questions such as “What should national authorities, parliaments and European organisations do to strengthen and enforce legislation and policies against racism and discrimination?”, “What is the role of parliamentarians?”, “How to engage with human rights organisation, equality bodies and grassroots organisations to drive forward positive change?”, this parliamentary discussion aims to take stock of the situation, exchange good practices including on the intersectional approach, and put forward proposals to end discrimination and racism. The event will also contribute to the preparation of the PACE Equality and Non-Discrimination Committee report on “Combating Afrophobia in Europe”.
